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she requested an information kit, a personal quit kit. That came from Midvale, Utah, and that's what I'm talking about, Senator Kruse. We have a program that's \$6 million over the biennium and yet we hire non-Nebraskans to staff this project, or at least one component of it. And that's what I'm talking about, Utah. It seems to me that if we're going to have a Nebraska program, let's have some jobs here in Nebraska. But that's a side issue. Listen, I won't speak on this again. Senator Landis has got a very good point that there is a lot of other important issues that we need to discuss. I don't agree with this. Senator Baker, as he mentioned that this is job preservation, and while I can't fault anybody for trying to do that in this time, we need to let some of these programs go. We've not been very successful at eliminating programs. Arguably, we shouldn't eliminate this one either, but it seems to me that when we have a tobacco settlement fund in excess of, you know, hundreds of millions of dollars, that we can't even find 3 million or 6 million dollars over the biennium to fund that? Well, where is all that money going? I mean I do appreciate Senator Byars' and Senator Jensen's willingness to revisit this issue come...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BOURNE: ...next year and reallocate of the trust monies, and I appreciate that. I will vote red on this but I won't do anything further to hang it up. I think it's wrong. I think it's backtracking from where we...what little ground we've gained over the session. I think that we've spoken on this three previous times. Hard times like this call for hard decisions and I'll be voting red on this and I urge you to do the same. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Bourne. Senator Baker.

SENATOR BAKER: Yes, thank you, President Cudaback and members. I think if we dug into this program, I think we might be surprised at what we'd find and where this thing...where these services are being come...where they come from. As Senator Bourne has pointed out, Utah. Why can't we find somebody in Nebraska to at least take care of this issue instead of sending
