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the majority of calls will be stopped, and then you add the FCC, which Congress has ordered to establish rules and regs to solve this problem, I suggest to you that the majority of calls will be stopped. The calls that aren't going to be stopped are those that are generated from...in our state, that are providing jobs to our citizens. And when I was up here discussing the bill earlier, somebody had said, hey, I heard that the majority of calls that come into Nebraska come in from outside the state. And I don't know if that's true or not. But the fact remains that we have both the FCC and the FTC, which, between the two entities, control the majority of corporations and entities that will make these calls. And both of these corporation...or, excuse me, both of these commissions, the FCC and the FTC, are required by Congress to adopt rules and regs. One has to have the rules and regs adopted by June...or, excuse me, July 1 of this year, and the other by September 7 of 2003. So again, if you think that we need another set of rules and regs and laws on the books; we need an additional one and a half persons, and maybe that means two; we need to expand government to solve a problem that the federal government is going to, let's go ahead and vote for the bill. But I recognize that the calls are a problem. But I also suggest to you that we can solve the problem by simply following the federal government's lead. I don't know what the sense of the body is here. I have this bracket motion up here. Obviously, it's almost seven o'clock on a late...on a night shortly before the end of the session. I'm going to withdraw the bracket motion, and I'm going to see what happens with the bill; see if Senator Smith can move it across. Maybe the body doesn't want to do this. I don't know. I'm not trying to be an obstructionist. I'm trying to say, listen, let's step back, let's see if this is...if the federal government...they've spent the time, they've spent our tax dollars to implement a program. Let's see if it works. And let's not squash an industry that's a vibrant, vital industry here in Nebraska. I wish that some of you that had call centers in your district would stand up and say what they have done for your district. These call centers, they provide decent paying jobs, they provide benefits. They revitalize communities. Senator Cunningham, I know that we put one up there in Wausa. Now, that's an inbound one, and I'm not suggesting otherwise. But what has that done to your community? That's a call center.
