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these circumstances or could be in these circumstances. All it is is a form that the students...that the school passes out. It doesn't promote abortion. It has...the only thing it has to do with abortion is that it's information about the process of notification of parents and about judicial review. Don't let this turn into an abortion issue. It's not and it's an information issue. And I would suggest that if we don't have the schools doing it, then this information is not going to be readily available to the students who need that information. If you can tell me a better way to do it, fine. There was a long discussion on this floor, Senator Foley, about school counselors and what they could and could not do, and what they should and should not do. The fact of the matter is that most of the schools in this state don't have school counselors, and that was, excuse me, that was brought out in the debate several times. And then the question becomes, well, then are the teachers going to be drawn into it? And, ultimately, this body decided...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...that it was better that the schools, themselves, do it, as an institution and that it be given out to students as information, a piece of information only. I think if you do this, if we pass LB 172, we have cut off the information from these students. And this is not something that you're going to go look for on the Internet. You don't even know it exists. How can you go look for it on the Internet if you don't even know that parental notification exists in Nebraska? These are students. These are young people. They need information, and how we can say we don't want them to have this information, I don't know. I would ask for consideration of this amendment which returns the bill to its original form, I am talking about the actual legislation, and does away, essentially, with LB 172.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Schimek, your light was next. Do you wish to continue? She does not. She waives off. Senator Foley.
