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limb and on that plaque is the law and the punishment. You have notice.

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I'm trying to make a point. Thank you, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Erdman.

SENATOR ERDMAN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature. I rise in support of LB 172 and in opposition to AM2066. And I've been listening to the discussion and I think there has been some interesting points brought up that I guess I'd like to point out. As I read what Senator Foley is proposing under LB 172, it does not prohibit any school district from offering such information to the students that attend the school. And I was asking Senator Foley if this only applies to female students and he says, no, it's to be, you know, distributed to all students in the state. And I can honestly say that in my 4 years as a student of Bayard High School, which this law was in effect, never did I receive any information alerting me of this information that was in the statute. And so I'm not sure if the law is either being enforced or what the reality is. But I do know that the e-mails that I've received from some of the school districts are to the side that say we don't believe that this is within our scope of education. And so from that standpoint, I think that there is some common sense here. The other thing that I think is interesting to point out is you don't have to go to the Internet to find this information, and you don't even have to climb that cottonwood tree. You look in the phone book. Anybody that's in trouble, generally, and a lot of young people that face problems look to other young people and look to their friends, and we're in a society where information is readily available. And I've got to believe that, even coming from small town Nebraska, that similar ads would probably be found, whether you look in the Lincoln phone book, as Senator Foley has distributed on the floor where it specifically talks about judicial bypass information for minors. Hey, maybe I can call and find out what that information is. So I think that's readily available. The other
