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emphasize with schools districts and I do know that we do keep piling more and more onto school districts. I don't think handing out a form at the first of the year is anything that is costly or adds to their budgets or really invades their time in any way significantly. And I think that this has been done for 13 years. It has gone without really a hitch. All school systems respond to the issue in the same way. It may not be the most perfect way. It may not be the best way. But, again, if somebody can tell me a better way, I'd be very interested in listening to it. And I want to address the idea that you should be getting your information from a newspaper ad or from the Internet. I don't think that's a good way to do it. Now here you've got clinics that are offering abortions, clinics that are offering all kinds of different kinds of care. And stuck right in the middle of that, there's...I'm looking at Women's Services, P.C., it says judicial bypass information for minors. Well, frankly if I were 16 years old, I wouldn't know if that applied to me or not. I wouldn't even know what it was probably. Although I know teenagers are somewhat more sophisticated now than they were when I was growing up but, Senator Redfield, not all or not even most teenagers are sophisticated. And it certainly depends on what kind of resources their school districts have. I would suggest that most school districts and even most libraries probably don't have statute books, and it does...I mean I think we're stretching here if we think that teenagers are going to go to the statute books and look for answers to their questions. But what I want to say, really want to say, is that's not when they need the information when they're in trouble. When they need the information is before they get in trouble, trouble. Senator Redfield, I agree with what you said. I think, and I really believe this, that it's one more thing to put in their tool handbag, if you will. It's one more piece of information that will help them, hopefully, make right decisions. Even if it's kind of a deterrent perhaps, I think it is good information to have. I'd like to know why there seems to be such a reluctance to share this information with teenagers. Are we ashamed of the...
