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SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...law that we passed in the first place? Don't we want these teenagers to have good information? Aren't schools in the business of giving people information? Aren't they in the business of giving them correct information? I think the schools are the most credible and the most believable place for students to go for information. I don't think it's any of these other resources that we're talking about, and I believe it needs to be given so...on a regular basis so that students are aware that there is such a law on the books and that it does impact them if they or a friend of theirs gets pregnant and is unable to cope with that kind of a situation. So it does apply to males but perhaps...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...not in same way it does to young female students.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Before going to the next speaker who is Senator Foley, we'd like to recognize one in our midst who is very, very dear to all of us who happens to have a birthday today, and she maybe hasn't publicized that, and so we're not going to mention the age. But it's Kitty Kearns up here has a birthday. I think we should show her our appreciation and our congratulations. Sorry to embarrass you, Kitty, but we just had to do that. Happy Birthday. Senator Foley.

SENATOR FOLEY: Thank you again, Mr. President. I've circulated to all of our desks a copy of a different statute, and that's Nebraska Revised Statutes, Section 28-325; an interesting statute, for sure. It's been on our books for about 25 years. The statute reads, in part: an expression of the will of the people of the state of Nebraska and the members of the Legislature to provide protection for the life of the unborn child whenever possible. Later on in that same statute it says: that it is in the interest of the people of the state of Nebraska that every precaution be taken to insure the protection of every viable unborn child being aborted. In 25 years with this statute on our books, has a pro-life senator ever come forward with a bill demanding that the public schools
