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World-Herald asked for it. He said no. The Associated Press asked for it. He said no. The Lincoln Journal Star, they got the no answer. Then when the demagogues...Democrat Party asked for it, they were told no. SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. You've heard the opening on the motion to recommit LB 172 to Education Committee. There were a number of lights on prior to that. I know senators wishing to speak were Senators Quandahl, Raikes, Schimek, Landis, Smith, Foley, Chambers, Maxwell, and Redfield. If you wish to speak, leave your lights on. If not, you can take them off. Senator Quandahl

SENATOR QUANDAHL: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. I stand for a couple of different reasons; first of all to support Senator Foley in his efforts on this LB 172. I oppose the...Senator Chambers' attempts to recommit this to committee. I also oppose Senator Schimek's amendment on this. I do so for a couple of different reasons. We've been talking a little bit on the floor here about the history of this particular portion of the law that was passed back in 1991. But I will tell you that since 1991 there have been other attempts to remove this burden on school districts. As a matter of fact, I introduced a measure that would be very similar, if not identical, to LB 172 that was not successful in the past. I can also tell you that, along the same lines of what Senator Redfield has stated, is that this is a burden on school districts. When I introduced my legislation, I was approached by school boards, by school board members, by administration
