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SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Raikes. Senator Schimek, on the motion to recommit.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Mr. President and members. I'd like to ask Senator Bourne a question, if I might.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you yield, Senator Bourne?

SENATOR BOURNE: Yes.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Senator Bourne, this information that you distributed earlier, it says at the top that the draft was adopted by school board. Do we mean the State Board of Education?

SENATOR BOURNE: I will be honest with you, Senator Schimek. I think that's where this document came from. I can remember...now this was introduced last year, and I recall asking at the hearing for a copy of the form that's given to the students prior to October 1. And I found this in my file, so I'm assuming this was given over to me by a proponent of the bill at the time. So I can't tell you exactly who gave it to me but I believe this is the form that was adopted by the State Department of Education to satisfy the requirements of this statute.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: And I think you're probably right, Senator Bourne, but I'm going to ask Senator Redfield to maybe enlighten us a little bit further. Senator Redfield, you and I had a brief discussion about this. And would you tell me what your interpretation of this is? Is this a State Board of Education document?

SENATOR REDFIELD: Senator Schimek, if I may respond, on line 17 in your amendment you see that there was a requirement on the State Board of Education to develop and disseminate a draft of the information that would be given to schools. But the language says very specifically in line 19 that this form "may" be used by schools, which means that schools have the ability then to condense that information as they give it out; they do
