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was talking about. I think every student, if they were...a girl would find herself pregnant, would be talking to her counselor or doctor and could express that fear of what might happen in that situation and they would be told that. And I see where the...one of the notifications that is given out that was laid on our desk talks about this young student, and Senator Schimek says 12- and 13-year-olds, that they need to go and convince a judge that she is mature and capable of giving information...informed consent to the proposed abortion, or that the performance of the abortion without notification of one of her parents or her guardian would be in her best interest. I have a hard time believing that a 12-year-old is capable of doing that. And I think at this very time when a situation like that is...like this is so serious, that more than any time that they need the help and counsel of their parents. And I think by far the majority of them would give them the loving help, they care for them, and want to help them through a situation like this the best they can. I just think the wrong place is for the schools to have to do that. The schools do not want to do it. Another school talks about, this is the only area in which we can by law give students information to not communicate with their parents. In a time when we promote and expect open communication among all parties in all venues, this provision has flown in the face of that expectation. I just think it's the wrong place to do it in our schools. I think there are a lot of other information out there, and counselors. I think students are very comfortable with going to the counselors, and the counselor could give them some information if they really could convince them that they would be in danger because of a parent. I just think there's so many more out there that need the counsel of their parents, and we need to promote that as much as we can. Thank you.
