passed and I've never received one phone call about it, never. I'd be interested to know about the rest of you, if you've...from the public, not from the schools, have you ever received any calls from your constituents about this? I don't think it's a huge issue, and I think the schools have been doing their job and we ought to let them continue to do their job. And if Senator Price comes back on the floor, I will ask her what kind of feedback that she, as a school board member, before she came into this Legislature, got on this issue. And I'll be surprised if she tells me it was a big issue. If it had been, I think the school board would have been to see us. With that, Mr. Chairman, I relinquish the rest of my time...or I give the rest of my time to Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Members of the Legislature, we are at an impasse. Senator Foley cannot discuss any alternative on this bill. But one reason I wanted to speak is because I handed out a sheet that have two articles. One is from the Omaha World-Herald and it's dated January 23 of 2003, and the headline is "Right to Life director agrees to program," and it explains how, in exchange for a felony charge being dismissed, Julie Schmit-Albin, an antiabortion leader, entered a pretrial diversion program. The second article, also from 2003, is dated August 21, 2003, from the Lincoln Journal Star, and the headline from that is "Right to Life director completes court diversion program. The guy that had stolen this e-mail information and had illegally listened to voice mail that Julie Schmit-Albin, the saint, the one who's going to tell everybody else how to do the right thing, was allowed to enter the diversion program. These are crimes of dishonesty, sneaking, snooping, underhandedness. That's what she, by her choice, can be described as having been engaging in. And she carried on this illicit activity for a period of six months. Naturally, her lawyer is going to say, well, she didn't do anything wrong. But in the Lincoln Journal Star column you'll see where, in entering this pretrial diversion program, she, quote, accepted responsibility, unquote, for the things that she was accused of having done. She paid the diversion fees, and she did some work for a Catholic agency. And she is a Catholic and she's
