But I feel more strongly about those who take these public positions of being so righteous, so much above everybody else in morality, then they engage...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...in this underhanded criminal activity. This was a felony and there's no way, if I were charged with a felony and I had not committed it, that I would agree to anything that implied I had any guilt. I would not enter a diversion program. I'd tell them, take me to trial. I would insist on it. She did it. She knew she had done it, and now she's skulking around here, tainting our system. Others won't talk like that. They think it and they feel it, but they're too cowardly. I am not. This is where all of the truth should come forth, and I think Senator Foley should be honest with Senator Schimek and tell her he is in a position where he cannot agree to anything else. That's why I don't even ask him. I know what his answer is. That would waste some of my precious time. Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, Senator Schimek.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers and Senator Schimek. Senator Bourne.
