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constitution and that they don't stem from their parents, particularly in those circumstances when the parents in these situations have fully proven themselves to be untrustworthy and unworthy of that trust and faith and love of their children. There is a place for this information to operate. There are a number of...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR LANDIS: ...circumstances when we should allow this notice to get to the child without having been the product of working it through with parents.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time, Senator Landis.

SENATOR LANDIS: Thank you very much.

SENATOR CUDABACK: I'm sorry. Senator Chambers, and this will be your third time, Senator.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. President. You're beginning to sound monotonously like a person who brings me nothing but bad news; however, those are the rules and I will abide by them. And I can create opportunities for myself to speak, so I want to applaud your attention to the rules and tell you I appreciate it. And I also want to demonstrate that I abide by the rules, even though I'm the one who voted against adoption of the Legislature's rules, the only one who voted against. But I will comply with the rules, I bet, more circumspectly than anybody else on this floor, bar none, because I know the rules and some people don't and they might inadvertently move astray. In this one time to speak, I'm not going to be able to say everything I want to say, so I want to touch on Mad Cow briefly, because as I have made some comments about the cattle industry particularly, Senator Loudon whirled in his chair. Well, if I had done it, it would have been like whirling. He kind of, in a leisurely, philosophical way, kind of maneuvered his chair around so he could look at me and see if he was really hearing what he thought he was hearing from me. Congress, Senator Loudon, didn't feel that downer cattle should be taken out of human food supply. They defeated that. They didn't think that should
