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are the kind of issues people shy away from, but I think they all play into our discussion when those are the things that have a bearing on what kind of legislation is brought before us. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Schimek. This also will be your third time, Senator Schimek, outside of closing.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Mr. Chairman and members. I might remind you that we're on the amendment that basically restores the statutes to what they were before LB 172, and simply makes a technical amendment which changes "bypass" to "waiver," which is probably, I guess, a more accurate term. So I wanted to remind you of what we're talking about here. I came in here with that amendment because I really wanted to maintain what we've got. I think it's a good procedure and it works and people get the information that they need, and I don't think it's been a huge problem. Some of the school people feel differently and have proposed from time to time different ways of advancing their issue or solving their issue with the current situation, and it's really interesting. While Senator Chambers and others have been talking, I've had an opportunity to look at some past discussions on this bill and some past problems with it, and one of the things that I found out is that several people on several occasions thought there was agreement on doing the bill that Senator Bohlke had proposed and then, all of a sudden, it didn't work out that way. And it seems that some people came in and said...some people from Right to Life came in and said they would rather have the present, the present system, or no system rather than doing the toll-free number. So even though I'm going to introduce that so that we can talk about it, I don't know that...I don't have any hope for having any support for that idea, Senator Foley, but I think it is another option and one we should talk about. I have the feeling that there is no compromise on this issue. Unless...unless I...unless Senator Foley has had a change of heart, there is no compromise on this issue, so I guess we'll still go on talking about it, fighting it, doing everything we can to change people's minds on it. I don't think it has to be that way and I would invite Senator Foley to give us some clue if he would consider changing his
