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SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR FOLEY: ...certain social messages to students. These young kids today, they're getting pounded by all kinds of social messages from a lot of different sources, and we should not be using the public schools for this purpose. So I appreciate your comments, Senator Loudon, on the bill.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Loudon and Senator Foley. (Visitors introduced.) Senator Schimek, on the Chambers amendment, FA1400, to your amendment.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members. And, Senator Chambers, I would support your amendment. I don't know if you know that I have an amendment, two amendments down, that changes it to December 15, but I do, and it doesn't matter to me what the date is. That's not the point. So I'll go along with whatever anybody says. But Senator Price is back on the floor now and I would like to ask her a question or two about the experience here in Lincoln and, Senator Price, the main question I wanted to ask you was, when you were a school board member, did you ever get a call from any parent regarding this issue?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Price.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: And I honestly didn't know the answer to that before I asked you a few minutes ago.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Price, would you yield?

SENATOR PRICE: Senator Schimek, in 14 years, I never did receive a call from a parent.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: And why do you think that is? I mean, how did the Lincoln Public Schools handle this information?

SENATOR PRICE: Once a year, every 7th, 8th, 9th, 10th, 11th, 12th grader is given a sheet of paper and it lists the notification, it lists...but the six, seven lines that has been distributed here on the floor, and at the top of the paper it
