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That's just the way it goes. They won't provide this up-front information, and so how are students going to find out about the law as it is, the parental notification part of it and the judicial bypass part of it? Well, they're not going to find out about it until the need arises, and by that time...

**SPEAKER BROMM PRESIDING**

**SPEAKER BROMM:** One minute.

**SENATOR SCHIMEK:** ...the damage has been done. And, you know, I'll come back on another time and talk about some of the suggestions that were made on the floor at the time this bill was being discussed, and I can't emphasize to you too much how much I think this was a good compromise between two sides that really didn't see eye to eye on this issue in the first place, and I hate to see that undone now without any alternative at all. And I reiterate, I am willing to work on alternatives, but so far I haven't had any suggestions brought forward by those who are supporting this bill. The ones that I have made have not been received very well. So I guess we just wait and see what happens. Thank you.

**SPEAKER BROMM:** Thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Chambers.

**SENATOR CHAMBERS:** Thank you, Mr. President...oh, Mr. Speaker. I would like to ask, if I may, Senator Louden a question or two.

**SPEAKER BROMM:** Senator Louden, would you yield, please?

**SENATOR LOUDEN:** Yes, I will.

**SENATOR CHAMBERS:** Senator Louden, are you in any way connected with the cattle industry: production, slaughtering, processing?

**SENATOR LOUDEN:** We produce them but we don't slaughter them.

**SENATOR CHAMBERS:** You do what?

**SENATOR LOUDEN:** We produce cattle, but...
