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SENATOR LOUDEN: Well, for ever since that came about, there's no cattle under 30 months of age or, well, no meat from any cattle under 30 months of age can come in from Canada.

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR LOUDEN: And, as far as I'm concerned, there isn't any...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, that's not my question.

SENATOR LOUDEN: ...cattle that can come in from Canada.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's not my question. Let's say uninfected cattle come in to Nebraska. They are fed, fattened, slaughtered, and processed in Nebraska. What would the label say about the origin of that beef?

SENATOR LOUDEN: At the present time, it wouldn't say anything.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What would the label say if there were a labeling requirement?

SENATOR LOUDEN: It would probably have to have, if it was the COOL, it would have to be the country of origin labeling on them, or if it was a traceability or a trackability, then it's...the process now is they're trying to work it around to where you'll know exactly what ranch it came from in the United States.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you know that all countries from which America imports beef, and some of which winds up in Nebraska, do not allow the use of downer cattle?

SPEAKER BROMM: Time. Your light is next, Senator Chambers. Proceed.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Senator Louden, so that the question is not convoluted, are you prepared to say that downer cattle are not allowed in the food supply in any country on the face of the earth?
