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all, that's what would happen to me. But the point I want to make here is that I'm trying to correct the grammar in this statute. And if you vote for this amendment, you are not saying anything other than that there is a proper way to construct language, and we're going to do that as we enact laws. But I say again what I said this morning. I'm developing a notion of what my colleagues' attitude is toward legislation and legislating, and lessons such as that are not wasted on me. Senator Louden, I won't just say what I'm saying today and then do something tomorrow,...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...something different. I'll be the same. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Schimek.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Thank you, Mr. President and members. I would like to continue to talk about another aspect of this bill that I don't think has gotten enough attention, and that is, what happens to the young woman if she doesn't know what the provisions of the bill are, and she goes to a provider and asks for an abortion, and she finds out she's going to have to tell that she's abused in order not to have to tell her parents or have the provider tell her parents. Okay. So let's say that she's told the doctor and that she gets her abortion. Let's say that happens. But then when she goes home, CPS comes in and investigates. Any parent who is accused of abusing their child, whether it was true or not, would probably respond...would respond with a great deal of anger. The problem here is that the parent who abuses their child when they get angry, it is the child that they take it out on. And then this same person goes on in another place to talk about another story that this friend of hers told her about abuse. She says,...or she said, the friend said, when my mother was beating me and banging my head against the wall, I got so I would just stare at the ground and say over and over to myself, you're going to make it through this, you're going to make it through this. She said, I got so I could never look at my mother, and truly believed that I couldn't look at my mother. And there reached a point where it
