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made her mother even angry, and it prolonged the abuse. But she said, the woman said, I truly believed that if I looked at my mother and established eye contact, I would die. I'm asking you, this senator says, to appreciate the magnitude and intensity of the fear that kids who are abused live with. And the only hope that we can throw out there is to give them enough information ahead of time to be able to make that decision and to go into that situation with their eyes wide open. I think we should have a lot more concern about the kids that are involved here than we would have about whether somebody has to hand out a piece of paper or not. It breaks my heart that we are not going...that we are thinking that we are not going to give this information to children who desperately need it. We're not talking about the children that comes from your home or my home--I hope at least we're not. We're talking about the child who's in a very, very precarious situation. Those are the ones we should be concerned about. And if we take this provision out of the statutes, then we better have a very good provision to take its place. Thank you, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Schimek. Senator Chambers. And this will be your third time, Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you, Mr. Speaker. And I'm preparing another amendment, and I'm prepared to stay here till the cows come home, and I shall. This would be a good time to test me and see if this early in the session I can deliver. But if you once get my engine turning, expect it to continue tomorrow and the next day, because I'm very serious. And you all are thinking about issues that mean something to you, and what will happen when we get to them. This issue means something to me, and you see how hard I'm going to fight it. And I would expect you to fight for your issues just as hard. I should expect that, but I really don't, because you can be pushed aside and turned aside. Women are put down in this society, because even though they make up a majority of the population, they have been conditioned to take low and accept inappropriate treatment as being the way things are supposed to be. This is the kind of issue which should have young and old women out in the street on the issue of women being insulted, disparaged, degraded by the Legislature. Senator Jones did not read a letter from a parent.
