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SPEAKER BROMM: Oh, I said one minute. I'm sorry.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, that's...

SPEAKER BROMM: You've got a little bit left...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's okay.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Schimek, your light is next, followed by Senator Redfield.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Yes, thank you, Mr. President and members. I hope you're not too distracted to listen to the discussion this morning, because for myself, I think it's a very important discussion, and I think that we ought to be serious about it. I will reiterate just a little bit of what I said yesterday, and say that my concern is not with the young woman who has good communication with her family and with her parents. My concern is with the young woman who doesn't have that kind of support, who isn't able to communicate with her parents, and in fact, in some instances, is fearful for her well-being because of the family situation that she's in. And I'm really serious when I say I would really like to find another way...if we can't do this, I would really like to find another way of doing it. And I've got a couple of ideas. I'd like to explore them this morning. I'd like to know if Senator Foley really is going to call for a cloture vote this morning, or if we're really going to have time to get to some of these significant issues. And I would...I guess part of my response to the Chambers motion is, well, I didn't know he was going to do this, but I'm not really surprised, I almost anticipated it, and I don't like to usually try to bracket somebody's bill, especially if it's their priority bill, but on the other hand, if there's no apparent desire to do anything but shove the bill across without any consideration for the issues raised, then I may vote to support this motion. I guess I need to ask Senator Foley a question or two, if I might, Mr. President.

SPEAKER BROMM: Senator Foley, would you yield to a question from Senator Schimek?
