SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Today, this is the way teenagers get their information. They go to the Internet. The teachers assign it. They all know how to use it. There are Internet access computers in the schools and in the libraries in every city and village. I would suggest to you that we have taken care of the obligation of those who need the information. Thank you very much.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Redfield. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. Speaker and members of the Legislature, a lot of people don't have access to computers. And I know some of them are going to jump up and say, well, they can go to the library, or they might even find it in school. But there are a lot of subjects, Senator Redfield, that students could get information from...about on the Internet, rather than pay attention in the classroom. Your argument is fallacious. It does not deal with the issue. And the school is the place that I'm talking about, in terms of obtaining the accurate information. What they present can be monitored. We know exactly what it is they give to these students. And since we talked about it but didn't put it into the record yesterday, I'm going to read the notification that the Lincoln school system hands out. "The Nebraska Legislature has passed a bill that may impact you. If a woman under the age of 18 who is not self-supporting or married becomes pregnant and decides to have an abortion in Nebraska, she will not be able to have an abortion without having one of her parents or her guardian notified of the pending abortion. If she does not wish to have her parent notified, she may appear before a judge and convince the judge that she is mature and capable of giving informed consent to the proposed abortion or that the performance of the abortion without notification of one her parents or her guardian would be in her best interests. If the judge makes a decision unsatisfactory to the woman, she may appeal the decision to the
