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alternative was to trap them. And I think my brother probably trapped and released at least eight possums last winter. And the day that was really interesting was when he had a skunk in his trap. Now, I will tell you that these were live traps. They weren't the clamp-type traps that some people think are barbaric. I can tell you, we have, in the rural Nebraska, we have a problem with the number of coyotes. And if you've ever seen a coyote that has started eating on a calf before the calf is dead, it's not very pleasant. Plus, it's an economic issue. But I think we need to preserve the ability to trap coyotes if necessary. There are a lot of coyotes. I know my sons shot four of them this fall. On the last pass--they were combining corn--they flushed them out of the field, and the four coyotes were shot. I can go out at my house at night, open the door, and you will find the coyotes howling at night. We have plenty of predators. We have to deal with them. I have had an occasion where we've had beavers in the creek by my place that we've had to have Game and Parks come in and trap them. And they can be a real pest. So this constitutional amendment probably would not be necessary. But there are forces working against these time-honored traditions. Some states have tried to ban trapping. And I think in those states, if they were successful, they would have a real problem with such things like bobcats. There's all kinds of things that you can run into a problem. California banned the hunting of mountain lions. Well, guess what, folks. They have a mountain lion problem in California now. And when mountain lions get displaced and get hungry, they kill people. It's very rare, but it does...it has happened. And so, Washington State is dealing with an issue where some people who think they're doing the right thing are trying to ban trapping. And so we have a real battleground up there. I would like to get out in front of this. I think the people of the state of Nebraska would like to vote on it. This constitutional amendment, by the way, is endorsed by the Nebraska Farm Bureau, by the Nebraska Cattlemen, and the Nebraska Game and Parks commissioners have passed a resolution in favor of it. It is supported by most of the hunting and fishing organizations of the state, like Pheasants Forever, Ducks Unlimited, you can just name it and go down the list and they're all in favor of it. They all have the fact that this constitutional amendment is going to be up this year in their
