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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Do you think that there will be a Nebraska Legislature that will outlaw fishing?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Not in my lifetime.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: In your children's lifetime do you think there would be such a Legislature?

SENATOR SCHROCK: I don't know. I've tried to get Senator Cudaback to go fishing with me, but he says he feels sorry for the fish, so he won't go. And I don't want to criticize my good colleague for being that way, because I respect his opinion. But you know, as the society becomes more urbanized, we have more people who are trying to do the right thing, that sometimes are doing the wrong thing even though they mean well. And I think this, what we're trying to do, is protect the right...this has been in the Vermont constitution since 1777. It was in the Virginia constitution, and back about 130 years ago Virginia, even though they had the right to hunt, fish, and trap, they decided it was against the law to hunt on Sundays. And it's still against the law to hunt on Sundays.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Schrock, with all due respect, you're obfuscating this morning.

SENATOR SCHROCK: All right.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And I don't mind you doing it, because we're going to be on this a long time. But to ask the question directly, do you believe that in the foreseeable future--and by that I meant your grandchildren and great-grandchildren's lifetimes--a Legislature will prohibit fishing in the state of Nebraska? Do you believe that?

SENATOR SCHROCK: Probably not, Senator Chambers, but there are those forces out there that would chip away at these rights. They would not outright ban hunting and fishing, but they might start chipping away at it.
