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to Senator Chambers, if he so desires.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, you have about 1, 45.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I'd like to ask Senator Vrtiska a question.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you yield, Senator Vrtiska?

SENATOR VRTISKA: Yes, I will.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Vrtiska, you support putting the issue of whether there should be casino gambling on the ballot, don't you?

SENATOR VRTISKA: I have not so far.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: But you intend to now since you said we're not doing it but it's up to the people. Or do you draw the line when it comes to something you disagree with?

SENATOR VRTISKA: Senator, I think all of us draw the line when we think it's the time to draw the line. I think you do, I do, everyone in this body does.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Well, I don't believe the constitution should be cluttered with any of it. But since I only have a short time, that's the only question I'll ask you. I want to call attention to all the things these people are saying when they stand up and say, well,...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...my constituents want this; a lot of people want it. Senator Stuhr talked about how many people there are, and somebody said, who knows more about hunting than Game and Parks. Who knows more about gambling than gamblers? And they want casino gambling. You're not going to put it on because a lot of them want it. That's the crowning level of hypocrisy on this floor and I'm going to call attention to it every time it rears its ugly head, and will continue to do so. Senator Kruse
