described himself in a way that fits everybody on this bill--cowards, cowards and haters of the constitution, or contemnners of the constitution; not condemn, c-o-n-t-e-m-n. They have no respect for the constitution, they do not understand the constitution, and when they trot out to these schools and talk to these children they ought to let them know that we believe that hunting and fishing and trapping should be in the constitution. They wouldn't dare do it. The kids would look at them like they're crazy...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...and laugh them to scorn.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Combs.

SENATOR COMBS: Yes, I just wanted to...thank you, Mr. President...read a letter here that came to us from Nebraska Sportsmen's Foundation. Twenty-nine senators do belong to the Nebraska Sportsmen's Foundation. And in quoting something that Senator Schrock just passed out from Nebraska Game and Parks, a resolution that was sent out by them says: "Be it further resolved that this commission wishes to express its appreciation of the efforts of the nonprofit organization, the Nebraska Sportsmen's Foundation and its 300 members, for their efforts to preserve the rights of all Nebraskans to hunt, fish, and trap." That did come from Nebraska Game and Parks, who are in support of the constitutional amendment. So if 29 senators out of the nearly 300 are members, that's about 10 percent of the membership are actual members of this body. This is a letter that did come from the Nebraska Sportsmen's Association (sic). They wanted to inform us about a similar constitutional amendment recently adopted by the state of Wisconsin. As you are aware, LR 4CA would propose to add language to the Nebraska Constitution, which we have already read and the quote is here. In the state of Wisconsin, an overwhelming majority of nearly 82 percent approved a similar amendment. This was an incredible victory for wildlife enthusiasts, conservationists, or those who do or someday will take part in these time-honored traditions. The passage of this amendment also revealed how much of a concern their residents have in preserving and protecting their
