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as naive and ignorant of reality as the general public, who manifested their ignorance by sending some of us here.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: There were two senators talking and they were sitting down. One of them was me. And a spancel of mules went by, a group of mules went by, and this senator said to me, Ernie, there go some of your constituents. I said, you got that right. You know where they're going? They're going out to your area to teach school. That's what I think of the education that's going on when I listen to the people on this floor. How can they talk to students who come here, and sometimes they will have gatherings of students who come to listen to these kind of people talk about the law, about the constitution? Why, they should not open their mouth because it is so out of keeping with what they do here. But you know what they do? They get their staff members to write something and then they read it the best they can to try to sound like...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...they have a modicum of intelligence. I see you nodding. Do you agree, Mr. Chairman, or what?

SENATOR CUDABACK: See, your time is up. I'm sorry.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, okay.

SENATOR CUDABACK: There are no further lights on. Senator Chambers, you may close on your Fall67 to LR 4CA, if you care to.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. Members of the Legislature, I've had some people tell me that they don't want this to ever come to a vote, and I'm going to do my part to help them. That's why I think they come to me, because I will, and I won't get tired and I certainly will not get tired of defending the constitution. What this amendment would do is alter this language so that it would say, a constitutional amendment to preserve the right to fish for anglers, trap trappers, and hunt.
