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General Patton. First of all, I guess one thing, I don't...did you...did Senator Chambers mention that I loved him? I don't think I ever mentioned that I love him.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Is that a question...?

SENATOR FRIEND: Okay. The...no, that's okay. He doesn't have to yield to a question. The exact...it was actually in a movie, so it was dramatized. The exact quote in the movie--and it could be a little bit wrong--was, when he looked across a battlefield with a bunch of people laying on that battlefield, was, to his aide: I love it; God help me, I do love it so. Now, I...there's no doubt in my mind that Senator Chambers loves what's going on here. But I disagree with some of my colleagues that believe that this is frivolous language. I am not a constitutional expert, not pretending to be. But I have looked extensively at what we're dealing with as a constitution, and this seems like appropriate language. I should say, not Fall69, but the underlying resolution. So I wanted to correct the record and have some fun with Senator Chambers, and also just show my commitment to LR 4CA. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Friend. Senator Chambers. And as you know, this is your third time.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Yes, but not my last. Maybe on this one, and maybe not. Members of the Legislature, I have promised to keep...promises to keep, and miles to travel before I sleep. And we are going to be on this provision that Senator Schrock brought to us for enough time to show the seriousness of trying to amend the Nebraska Constitution in a way that I think is frivolous. I'd like to ask Senator Friend a question or two.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Friend, would you respond, please.

SENATOR FRIEND: Yes, I will.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Friend, I don't know if you followed the discussion in terms of the unlikelihood of fishing, hunting, and trapping being abolished by the Legislature, so I want to ask you a question. Do you see, in the foreseeable future, a
