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depending on where it's happening, I mean, you know, I think the state can take precautions to protect itself and its citizens.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Prevention can sometimes be better than cure. So if there's a possibility of these extraterrestrials coming to Nebraska and doing harm, what harm would there be in the Legislature enacting a criminal statute that would punish such extraterrestrials?

SENATOR FRIEND: You're saying if there are extraterrestrials and we've been able to show precedent where they have caused harm in other states,...

SENATOR CHAMBERS: No, you're adding to what I said.

SENATOR FRIEND: No, I don't think I am.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Here's what I'm saying.

SENATOR FRIEND: Then I don't understand what you're asking me, then.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. If...you agreed that there's a possibility that there are extraterrestrials.

SENATOR FRIEND: Yes, but I have no proof.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That's why we make it a possibility.

SENATOR FRIEND: Okay.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: I don't have any proof that there are not.

SENATOR FRIEND: I know.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. So the possibility is there. There's a possibility that they may be friendly; there's a possibility they may be hostile. If they are...we're not worried if they're friendly. We don't need a law to authorize people to be friendly. But if there's a chance they would be hostile, what would be wrong with having a law to deal with that contingency?
