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You know something that is interesting, Senator Friend? You will get a letter of the kind handed out by Senator Schrock, from some law professor--if everything in the letter is as it represents itself to be, and I'm going to say that it is--who has a pride of authorship, because he wrote the language that was accepted in Minnesota, so you know he's going to say that everything is all right with it, that there have been no problems. The people who supported putting that constitutional amendment dealing with corporate farms are saying that there are no problems with that, because they supported it. You have to find objective people, those who are disinterested, have nothing to gain by expressing an opinion. This is why when a person comes to court and is presented as an expert, the court allows the other side to question that individual very closely, to see whether or not he or she is indeed worthy of being accorded the status of an expert. Once you're given that status, you are allowed to express opinions that ordinary citizens are not. Your training, experience, and the other factors that go into making you an expert, raises you a step higher when it comes to testifying on certain actions in court than would be accorded the ordinary citizen, or even a lawyer or a judge who is not an expert. I'm not going to say I'm an expert on the constitution, but I will say I'm a strong defender of it, and I will say I'm a stronger defender of it than anybody on the floor. That does not exclude the "Silver Fox," who has not been with us very much, but I'm sure he has us in his prayers--because that's what they always say when people are facing rough situations, and I've been kind of roughing up my colleagues, I've been told. I was pointing out why somebody situated as I am, as a black man, would be such a ferocious defender of a constitution that I played no part in bringing into existence, in fact, a constitution that contains a provision directed negatively against me. Senator Friend, there is nobody who has achieved that status in this state in its history, to have a constitutional amendment not put to the public by angry legislators, but originated by the people. The majority of the people, white people in this state, are so afraid of me, or so hate-filled toward me, that they amended their constitution to attack me. Hard to be humble, hard to be modest, but I think I manage both of those very well. Despite that negative slap at me in the constitution, I have to try to uphold it, because the
