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goes on to the prosecutor, who then makes the ultimate factor, and then on to the judge and jury, who then determines. That's why hate crimes are important to me, because when you see the looks on these people's faces when they've been beat up, have their property destroyed, or whatever, because of what they believe in, it's not right. Everybody knows I'm a pro-life candidate. Several years ago, a prominent pro-choice person died. The day of his funeral, extreme pro-life people showed up at his house and picketed in front of his house, with all these grotesque pro-life signs and things like that. And to me, that's not right. You've got to look at the human element when you're involved in hate crimes. And some people say, well, we've got the crimes on the book already. But you've got to take into consideration the human element when you're dealing with these people and what they go through when things like that happen. And that is why I support the legislation and Senator Brashear's amendment and the bill. I'll return my time to you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Mossey. Senator Foley, on your amendment.

SENATOR FOLEY: Thank you again, Mr. President. I wonder if Senator Brashear would continue our conversation. I wonder if Senator Brashear would continue the conversation, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Would you respond, Senator Brashear?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: Yes, Mr. President.

SENATOR FOLEY: Senator Brashear, yesterday afternoon, I showed you an amendment. The one that's filed now is actually a different amendment, so I know that you haven't had a chance to perhaps fully digest it, but it is short and sweet. And do you have any tentative comments regarding the...that particular formulation of words?

SENATOR BRASHEAR: (Laugh) I'm tempted, Senator Foley, I have a number of tentative comments, but this is your time. I have my light on. Do you want me...
