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is wrong, okay? I believe Senator Mossey is wrong. I believe a hate...I don't care why somebody burns a cross in somebody's yard. Senator Chambers just spoke to this issue. I don't care. There are people that deal with that issue better than I do, from a judicial standpoint and a law enforcement standpoint, that are out there to handle that. That's not our issue right here and right now. Our issue is to try to figure out whether we're supposed to correct flawed law. We found something that a lot of folks probably in this body believe is flawed law. Is it our job to correct that flawed law if we all can come to an agreement or a conclusion that that's the case? I believe it is. I believe that Senator Brashear has convinced me of that. I don't know that Senator Mossey will ever be able to convince me of the idea that if somebody throws a rock through my window because they didn't like the way I looked that...it's not going to matter to me. But again, let's step back. That's not what we're dealing with. Is it our obligation to correct that flawed law? I think that it is. That leaves me with this. FA1403, I believe that an unborn child is a human being. That unborn child is just as much of a human being. You remember that I mentioned my sister. She lives in a certain state in a nursing home. That unborn being is as much of a human being as my sister is. What do we do with Senator Foley's amendment? I got to tell you, I don't know. I love it, but I don't know and I don't know how I'll vote on it. Does that fix the flawed law that Senator Brashear was talking about? As far as I'm concerned, sweep the original hate crime argument away. That's how I feel about it. And then how do we fix the flawed law? That's my feeling. Help me out, if we have an hour, if we have two hours. I believe that I know I'm going in the right direction. I don't know what to do with FA1403. Help me out with that. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Friend. Senator Dwite Pedersen.

SENATOR Dw. PEDERSEN: Thank you, Mr. President, members of the Legislature. LB 270 is to correct a flawed hate crimes law. You've all heard that. As a child and as a teenager growing up in my home, one thing we were not allowed to use is, ever, I hate you, or I hate him, or I hate her. We could say I hate
