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clear on what...you said an employee could ride back there? Is that...?

SENATOR AGUILAR: I'll give you an example, because this came up in some of the questions in the committee. The example was, what about young men that detassel for a living? They have to ride in the back of a pickup to get from field to field. You know, we don't want to prevent anybody from not being able to work. So for that reason, I agreed to that exemption.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: How about if they're baling hay for me, and I want them to ride from the barn to the field, and I have to go on a highway?

SENATOR AGUILAR: Then I would suggest that there be a seat back there with a safety-approved seat belt around you.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: That's what it would take to be legal?

SENATOR AGUILAR: And I also would point out that you are a little bit over 18, so it wouldn't apply to you.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: No, I'm talking about my kids or of my hired help that would...might be helping put up hay. And I mean, this is an...not an everyday activity, but it's not an unusual activity to ride a pickup back and forth to a hay field, or whatever. That's...so that's out?

SENATOR AGUILAR: And I understand, and that happens all the time, and children die doing that.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Yeah, and that's definitely out? That is not part of the (inaudible)...?

SENATOR AGUILAR: As long as they are not an employee, I would say, yes, they are...it's out.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Okay.
