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SENATOR QUANDAHL: Okay. And then just maybe one more question. I guess I understand what a parade is. You're going to have to help me out on a caravan. What does...what constitutes an officially authorized caravan?

SENATOR AGUILAR: My explanation of that would be, like, a group of motor homes, or whatever, that are traveling in a procession together.

SENATOR QUANDAHL: Okay, okay. So...but I think the key to your subsection (b) is that whatever the parade is, it's going to have to get a permit from some sort of a governing body before it's officially authorized.

SENATOR AGUILAR: Yes, sir.

SENATOR QUANDAHL: Okay. And so me, being a state senator in west Omaha, saying, kids, you're officially authorized to drive those trikes down the sidewalk, that isn't going to cut it under this bill.

SENATOR AGUILAR: That's not going to cut it, Senator.

SENATOR QUANDAHL: Okay. Thanks.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Quandahl. Senator Smith, on LB 227.

SENATOR SMITH: Thank you, Mr. President, members. I apologize for not being specific enough last time. But I do want to continue in this vein that we've been working on, and that is, a caravan, is there anything...let's...I would speculate, I guess, that counties would not have...county governments would not have too many provisions for a parade. I'm guessing that's a city thing, and counties would not have a provision. Would you agree with that?

SENATOR AGUILAR: I would agree with that.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Aguilar.
