Aguilar can dispute that if he wants, but I believe that was the intent of the committee when we advanced the bill. A limited number of people testified for the bill. No opponents. So that's just a bit of the background, as I'm recalling it now, a little piece at a time, with Senator Byars and Senator Thompson, how we got where we are, and what we did last year. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Baker. Senator Vrtiska. Did you wish to...he waives his opportunity. Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, I didn't want to get into the debate, but I must. Before I say what I intended to talk about, I think what Senator Smith discussed with Senator Aguilar points out the vagueness of this bill. A traffic infraction is a crime. A criminal statute is strictly construed. If there is anything that is vague or ambiguous, the statute is unconstitutional. You have vagueness when reasonable people cannot determine what is allowed and what is prohibited by reading the language of the criminal statute. The fact that Senator Smith can make a plausible argument that it means one thing, and Senator Aguilar can plausibly argue that it doesn't, shows vagueness. And a person does not know what is actually allowed under this bill, and those who support it cannot completely agree. So I think it's too vague. I think it's unconstitutional. Here's my question. What is a vehicle?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Are you asking...?

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Senator Aguilar.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Aguilar, would you respond?

SENATOR AGUILAR: That could be anything from a truck, car, trailer, any motor vehicle.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Uh-uh. It could include that. But it also includes those things which are not motor vehicles, doesn't it? This doesn't say "motor vehicle"; it says "vehicle," which is broader than "motor vehicle." So when you have a very broad term, it includes the things you talked about, but others. It could include something that a child would ride as a toy. That
