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cross-referenced. Maybe it does list specific violations, but I'm not sure. But there should be something which will let these young people know the punishment...

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...if they do certain things by way of a violation. And I do not think every violation is of equal magnitude or seriousness. And such being the case, a one-size-fits-all punishment could be disproportionate, either in being too mild or being too severe. I'm not going to try to find a way to straighten out all of those issues on General File. I told Senator Vrtiska already that I'd be willing to work with him. The reason I feel differently about this bill from what I felt about Senator Aguilar's, we are not creating a new category of offense out of whole cloth; we're trying to determine what is the best and most equitable way to deal with an already existing set of circumstances. So if we wind up doing nothing, we still have in place a statute. In the case of Senator Aguilar's...

SPEAKER BROMM: Time..

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Thank you. (Laugh) Your timing is impeccable, Mr. Speaker.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Vrtiska.

SENATOR VRTISKA: Thank you, Mr. Speaker, members of the body. I...you know, I understand that all of these things become somewhat complicated, but I just want to reiterate one thing. This particular person, a juvenile, by the way, was assessed a fine, if I remember right, of either \$50 or \$100 as a fine. Her license was revoked, under the statute that we passed a few years ago, for what I consider a very minor infraction of the law, and that's driving a couple, three blocks out of her route to and from school. Now, we understand, and they have to understand, and she did understand, because she paid a fine. The issue that brought this to a head was the fact that after she paid the fine then she had to go and pay \$125 to get her license reinstated, because it was revoked under the present
