SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Baker. Senator Louden.

SENATOR LOUDEN: Thank you, Mr. Speaker and members of the body. Since I've probably had about as much experience with learner's permit and school permit as anyone around in this area, because in the district I serve, school permits are a big item. And usually, when these kids have these permits to drive to school, this is something that's very serious, because if they don't drive themselves to school, and someone has to, and that has quite a detriment sometime on the farming/ranch operation that they're from. So I think...I understand Senator Chambers, his idea of some type of a deterrent to it, and I think that's...he's probably correct in that. But to me, when you have the part in there that they lose that learner's permit or school permit until age 16 when they're eligible for a driver's license, is quite a fine, in a way. Because this not only affects the whole family, affects them, and as far as the learner's...or the school permit, why, usually all it can be used for is drive back and forth to school and school functions. But the way the bill is now, I think, is probably the way I would like to see it supported. I don't think we need to put in some type of fines or anything that would cause a hardship on these kids, because most of them are kids that are probably chasing around someplace where they shouldn't have been. That's usually the reason kids lose their school permit. And most of the times I've seen, they usually have had two or three warnings, and by the time they get that second or third warning and the permit is gone, then they probably deserve to drive...to have somebody drive them to school from then on, because they can't be trusted. But I would like to see the bill progress on the way it is. And put the...have the "may" in there, as Senator Synowiecki has stated, it makes it something that looks like that I think would be favorable to me. Thank you.
