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amendment. Especially in smaller communities, sometimes you will have a law enforcement officer who, for some reason or other, has a little trouble with a young person, or there is a personality conflict there, if you want to say that, and whatever little infraction that young person might make, they are there, watching him very close, and will pull that young person over. And I know it probably happens more in smaller communities than it does larger communities. They know where everyone lives, and they'll watch for that young person to just make one little mistake. And that's something that I think that whoever is looking at that, whatever judge or, wherever he goes, a magistrate, should have the discretion to waive the problem that has been brought before him. And I think putting in there that they "shall" have that revoked, I think there should be, in my opinion anyway, a little leeway, and changing that to "may" would do that. I had one of those school permits. That's been a long, long time ago. But they were available then, and it said the same thing, to and from the school at the shortest route. And I, like everyone else, did violate that from time to time. And there was...you did have the...stand the chance of losing that permit. But I think the amendment to the bill would be the right way to go. So, Senator Synowiecki, I will be supporting that. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Janssen. We're on the committee amendments, and there are no further lights. Senator Baker, you'd be recognized to close on the committee amendments.

SENATOR BAKER: Thank you, Speaker Bromm. We've had quite a discussion here about a couple of words changed in the committee amendments, which is fine. Senator Beutler has also brought up another interesting point that I think we need to do a little work on. And I...if the body chooses to advance this to Select File, I think we need to clarify some things in...down in line 12 and 13 also. But it's nothing serious, Senator Vrtiska. So I would ask for adoption of the committee amendments. Thank you.

SPEAKER BROMM: Thank you, Senator Baker. You've heard the closing on the committee amendments. The question is the adoption of those amendments. All in favor vote aye, and
