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why did it suddenly become unreasonable when the heavyweights came in?

SENATOR BAKER: Well, I assume they were trying to raise some revenue and thereby...from these private companies, and thereby lowering their General Fund request to the Legislature, I would assume.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Are there other fund increases besides the going from \$1 to \$3, and this one from \$24 to \$36?

SENATOR BAKER: No. Well, no. No.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: That last amendment, what did that do, that was just adopted?

SENATOR BAKER: The last amendment was adopted changed the rate from the \$30 down to \$18 per...I'm sorry, it changed the, yes, from \$30 to \$18 per 1,000. It lowered it.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Okay. Now let me bring that into the discussion. It brought it down from \$30 to \$18. Did the department put \$30 in the original green copy?

SENATOR BAKER: Yes.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So they wanted to raise revenue from that fee also, didn't they?

SENATOR BAKER: Yes, but if you'll look at the committee statement, these are public companies, or companies operating...private companies operating, requesting government information.

SPEAKER BROMM: One minute.

SENATOR BAKER: And I see no reason wrong trying to generate some income for Department of Motor Vehicles, thereby lessening the burden on the taxpayers through General Fund requests.
