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SENATOR BOURNE: Right. My point is, is when you release a lien off of a car, you have to go to the bank, you have to get your title, then you have to go to the closest Department of Motor Vehicles site.

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR BOURNE: There's a stamp that's affixed at the county that releases...that acknowledges the release of the title, and then that's forwarded on to the state. And what I'm suggesting is that if a person had a lien on the car, they're not going to be able to do this within ten days.

SENATOR BAKER: I...maybe in the metropolitan area. I don't see it as a problem out there getting a lien released in ten days, unless my bank was in New York, possibly, and...which it's not, but...

SENATOR BOURNE: Well, I'm saying...

SENATOR BAKER: ...sending this in the mail.

SENATOR BOURNE: ...particularly Senator Jones, I don't know how far...I mean, I know some of our more rural parts of the state. You know, we had another bill last year, I'm going to put my light on, we had another bill last year that I had introduced that talked about of having, like, a uniform or a mandatory in transit sticker, and the rural folks, perhaps rightly so, were very upset because they couldn't get to the county seat in the time frame in which my bill had stated.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Time. Thank you, Senator Bourne. I'm sorry I interrupted you. (Visitors introduced.) On with discussion. Senator Bourne, you may continue.

SENATOR BOURNE: Thank you, Mr. President, members. Just to continue with this, Senator Baker, again, I'm not certain that ten days would be enough for an individual who has a lien on a car to get the check from the insurance company, to get that to the bank to have the title released. And I will tell you that
