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SENATOR CHAMBERS: Oh, okay.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Smith, your light is next. You may continue.

SENATOR SMITH: I'll let Senator Chambers continue, if he would like.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Chambers, you may go, if you wish.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Here's...let me make one thing clear. A traffic infraction is a crime. But it's not of the magnitude that Senator Smith is talking to us about. His is a crime in the traditional, lay person's understanding of a crime. Senator Smith, what is the penalty now if a person's car is not properly registered?

SENATOR SMITH: It's a Class III misdemeanor.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: What is the fine?

SENATOR SMITH: I believe it's \$50 to \$100.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Now, what does your language say about a vehicle that's not properly registered?

SENATOR SMITH: It would be zero to \$500, would be the case. So current law, someone could get off scot-free for dodging taxes for quite some time, and the green copy made it a minimum 50...up to \$500. But there would be some options there for the courts to decide.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: So an in-state person would face what kind of penalty?

SENATOR SMITH: The Class III misdemeanor, zero to \$500.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: And what would an out-of-state person face?

SENATOR SMITH: The \$500.
