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SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...here we come. So I'm going to fight this bill tooth and nail. And I know there are other people who are upset with it, but they feel that since I'm going to fight it, I can do all the work. But that's my job. I'm the garbageman. And this is an example of the debris that I must remove from the legislative plate. Thank you, Mr. President.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Chambers. Senator Redfield.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. Could I address Senator Smith for questioning?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Smith, would you yield to a question from Senator Redfield?

SENATOR SMITH: Yes.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Thank you, Senator Smith. I am wrestling through the language on the bottom of page 1, and trying to determine in your definitional piece there on determining who really owns that and whether in fact that vehicle should be taxed in Nebraska. And I mean, I'm understanding your basic premise, and in agreement with your premise, but wondering if we have language here that's correct. You have three criteria. You're talking about a person who owns or operates a business. And I'm wondering about someone from out of state, a legal resident of another state, who owned and operated a business here, but were to drive their own vehicle or another company vehicle from the other state, where they may have another branch of the company, into the state of Nebraska, how we would know whether in fact, under the terms of stored or kept, how law enforcement would be able to define that. If you would...could explain that.

SENATOR SMITH: Exactly the way they do now.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Is that common language now, "stored and kept"?
