up, maybe, on Senator Wehrbein's questions about the fiscal note. And it indicates that the Cornhusker State Industries, which are, of course the Prison Industries, will lose...they will lose some revenue from these plate sales. Is that right? Can you...?

SENATOR BAKER: A very,...

SENATOR SCHIMEK: ...elaborate?

SENATOR BAKER: ...very small amount of revenue. Actually, the cost is going to be higher on these new plates, which is the subject of another amendment. But it will be spread over six years. They may have a slight decrease in revenue.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Okay.

SENATOR BAKER: It's going to be minimal.

SENATOR SCHIMEK: Well, I just saw Senator Wehrbein come back on the floor with a slip of paper, and he put his light on. And I imagine he's going to pursue the fiscal thing. So I will return my time to the Chair, then, let him go ahead.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Schimek, were you...you completed your talk? Thank you. Senator Baker.

SENATOR BAKER: Yes, thank you, Senator Cudaback. In view of the questions that have arisen on the fiscal note, as far as people renewing their licenses less frequently with a six-year plate, we have, obviously, a bill on the floor dealing with registration issues, title...plates, and so on, Senator Smith. And what he does with that or where we go, that's kind of up to him, I guess, right now. I think we have another bill maybe in committee referred to us this year. But also, we have the insurance database that's going...that's being put into effect here I think September 1, I believe, or there...July 1. And that's going to have some effect on people keeping their insurance up, obviously. And I think probably we're targeting the same people that would not keep their insurance up are the same ones that would not go in and get their new annual
