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stickers. So we have some things in place. That's a law we passed I think a couple years ago, and it's being implemented. That should help renew vehicle registrations. And as you can note from the fiscal note, it's not very much. The years that plate renewals are required is 2.6 percent greater. I think the insurance database will probably have some effect on that and help in those...pushing those people toward maintaining current insurance and vehicle registration. So I believe...and as I said, that goes into effect this July 1. It's going to be a...quite a revolution to the way that people do business who buy insurance, cancel it 30 days later, and driving around uninsured. So it's demonstrated that it works well in Colorado. And it not only, I think, will cut down on uninsured motorists, but it's also going to help on registration issues. So I think that would probably address your concerns. I...in my own mind, I believe that's going to be a solution that may help indirectly vehicle registrations considerably, because I'm guessing the same people that fail to maintain insurance are the ones that we're targeting with bills like Senator Smith's. So with that, I would return the rest of my time to the Chair. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Baker. Senator Redfield.

SENATOR REDFIELD: Thank you, Senator Cudaback, members of the body. This is one issue that I have received repeated calls on through the years from constituents. They wonder why government is not making every effort to economize. And they look at this as an expense, whether or not the state sees a difference in our prison budget. But there is savings at the local county level. We take those plates, we have to transport them out to each county. When they get there, they have to store them. They have to have the space, which they cannot use for something else. At Douglas County, they keep them down in the lower basement, which means that they have to keep running down these stairs to bring them up, because there are so many, they really can't keep too many on hand. And in fact, the storage is very, very costly, because of the price of land and space in Douglas County. Then we have staff time involved in the handling of these plates each time, and we have postage. So in fact, the counties do tell us that there will be significant savings at their level. Now, if you're a small county, that may not be a
