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SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Pedersen. Senator Stuhr, on the committee amendments to LB 279.

SENATOR STUHR: Thank you, Mr. President and members of the body. I just rise in support of the committee amendments. I, too, had a note from county treasurers that signified that they had testified numerous times in the past about the tremendous expense and the inefficiency of swapping plates more frequently than any other state in the country, and I think that that is certainly a point that needs to be emphasized, that the three-year limitation is certainly less than any other state. And, in fact, they said the second most common complaint we receive from taxpayers is how frequently we swap our plates and the obvious money and material that it wastes. I also had a note from one of my constituents that said, it seems to me, with all the cuts that we're facing, it's absurd that we are looking at spending money always so frequently on new license plates. So with that, I do support the committee amendment. Thank you, and I give the rest of my time back to the Chair.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Stuhr. Senator Wehrbein, committee amendments.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Mr. President, members, I'd like to ask Senator Baker a question, and I have some comments. May I ask?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Baker, would you yield to a question from Senator Wehrbein?

SENATOR BAKER: Yes, I would.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Are we on the five- or six-year issuance right now?

SENATOR BAKER: Three.

SENATOR WEHRBEIN: Three?

SENATOR BAKER: Three. The most...as I think Senator Stuhr just mentioned, we are the only state that provides new plates every three years, only one in the Union.
