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same comments from some county officials, somewhat what Senator Wehrbein is talking about, is that as we increase this registration we are going...the counties are going to lose money, but the treasurers, may we have that much influence over the county boards and I...that they, you know, support this. But...and then maybe they'll be back to ask, you know, for some...for different things. And I think, as I heard Senator Stuhr and the conversation yesterday from the proponents of this bill, is that the reason we're going to this is to save money, save treasurer's time and so forth like that, and that's the possibility. We had a bill a couple years ago. I think my good friend Senator Dan Lynch had it a couple years ago, and we went in three counties to generic plates, and I think Senator Baker...or I mean, Senator Jones, can I ask you a question?

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Jones, would you respond?

SENATOR JONES: Yes.

SENATOR HARTNETT: We really are...your concern I think, and I think I heard Senator Stuhr, maybe Senator Baker talk about it, is that, you know, if we really want to save money, maybe we need to go...I call them, what...the plate I have in my county...see Senator Jensen standing up has the same type of plate in his place and Senator Beutler does over here...is if we really want to save a lot of money we should go to generic plates. That's what I call my plate that has three...a part of the alphabet and three numbers. If I offered that as a friendly amendment, not now but in the Select File, would you support that, Senator Jones?

SENATOR JONES: No, I would not. (Laughter)

SENATOR HARTNETT: I'll give the rest of my time back to the Chair. (Laugh)

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Hartnett. Senator Baker, committee amendments.

SENATOR BAKER: Thank you, Senator Cudaback. This is all pointing up to the fact that license plates are apparently
