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go back and pick that up. Another thing that was even brought out here a little bit yesterday and that is these plates every three years, well, how many of them go in the landfill? I mean that will only happen every six years now, and so there's a lot of pluses to this. In my counties, a lot of small counties that they order the whole year's supply at once so that they have a lot of boxes of plates sitting around, and all my counties are supporting it and so they would sure like to see this go to six years. So I think with this here amendment, putting it to six years in place of five, I think we should go ahead and vote on the committee amendments and move forward. Thank you.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator. Senator Jones, were you finished? Senator Chambers.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: Mr. President, members of the Legislature, as soon as people start talking about increasing fees, it catches my attention. The reasons given for increasing the fees have not impressed me. If there is an enforcement problem, I don't want to increase the fees on the public. Law enforcement has responsibilities and obligations. Let them carry those out, and if they don't carry them out, I don't want to shift the burden to the public and make them pay a higher fee. We have determined what it ought to cost to register a car, so if they bring up a bill this session, I'm going to fight it. If they bring it up next year, I'm going to fight it. As for what Senator Jones said his last time about some boxes being...that contain these license plates being a reason for this bill, he now has turned me against the bill. I thought there was something of consequence, but he's got some lazy, trifling people out there where he operates who say, well, we've got too many boxes so change the number of years these plates are good for. Why, that argument is good for nothing. I had stayed out of the discussion. I still haven't fully made up my mind, to be quite frank, but the direction that the arguments are going, the directions are not the kind that I want to see. But again, I'm just one vote, but I have a long voice. And I'm not going to let law enforcement or anybody else off the hook by simply saying a person has to pay a higher registration fee. Suppose people still engage in the same kind of conduct because human beings are creatures of habit. What are you going to say?
