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amendment and should not have to say, unless it's a very technical question, I've got to ask somebody what the answer is. There are responsibilities that people assume when they want these positions, but they just kind of go through the process slough-footed, box-ankled, pigeon-toed, and everybody will tend to sit back and tsk, tsk, tsk, and grumble and mutter and gripe under their breath, or to me, and never utter a word where it will make a difference. If I come up here and I bring a bill or I offer an amendment and it's contrary to what I had presented it as being, when I find out that I was in error, I'm the one who will correct it. I don't know what this state is going to do when I'm no longer in the Legislature, but I'll tell you what. A whole lot of trash bills are going to become legislation; a lot of bad things are going to happen to the public and they're going to say, how did this happen? So the one that these white people wanted to kick out of the Legislature is the one who's been their savior, and they don't have sense enough to know it. They are blinded by their racism and their sheer stupidity, but they get the kind of government they deserve. How many bills have I raised questions on this session? And the media might call it a filibuster, but other senators will begin to look at it and they'll begin to see issues. But a funny thing: When they're discussing it, the media don't say filibuster. If Senator Wehrbein, as Chairperson of the Appropriations Committee, has questions and issues to raise, I've never heard them refer to anything he said as a filibuster. I pay attention to these things. And they can say...they can alibi any kind of way...

SENATOR CUDABACK: One minute.

SENATOR CHAMBERS: ...they want to. They can temporize and say, well, it's easy to write "filibuster." Well, you write it, and then I'm going to deal with that too. Media people shouldn't get a free ride. They work for a living. That's all they are--people with a job--and they're going to do what their editors tell them to do. I've even had some of them tell me they can't cover certain things because my name appears too often in the paper, so they can't discuss certain issues or certain points that I make. So what they'll say is, Senator Chambers thought that this discussion would set the tone for the
