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to understand better why what he is doing, even though he may be lobbying for certain companies that want to get in, why isn't that also in the best interest of the farmers of Nebraska? Could you respond?

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: Senator Kremer.

SENATOR KREMER: Yes. I didn't make that accusation. I don't know who did. But when the bill...I think the one you're talking about, very original bill, had a deadline on it when they should be able to qualify. And I think that was to kind of see what was happening at that point, then maybe going from there. Then the bill, LB 7...or LB 536 that Senator Dierks had, there was a couple more plants wanted to come in and they was...he put a deadline on, so at that time we could stop and evaluate where we was at again. And he thought...at that time, remember, it was only two plants was all going to come on. And then a lot more come on, but there was a deadline on that to qualify. And at that point, they had to reevaluate the program. And I think what's happened is that there were about 20 applications, and it looks like four were going to make it. Several of them had the permits and everything else but did not get funding but not...who are not going to meet the deadline. So I guess it's kind of like do we make a deadline and do we mean it, or do we just keep extending it or something else. We ought to say there is no deadline if we really want to do that, so...

SENATOR BEUTLER: Yeah, well, I don't...I think if we put a deadline we should put a deadline.

SENATOR KREMER: Yeah.

SENATOR BEUTLER: But as you know, I'm also a believer as when we write the law we ought to write it clearly.

SENATOR KREMER: Yeah, and that's....

SENATOR BEUTLER: So what we're being punished for today is not Senator Schmit's fault, but our fault,...
