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SENATOR KREMER: No. What he is doing...

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...our fault that we didn't write the law clearly.

SENATOR KREMER: And I think that even in what you were on board, too, it's more than just a farmer help to have a market for feed grains, it also helps our communities in economic development. It provides jobs and it's a clean air standard and...

PRESIDENT HEINEMAN: One minute.

SENATOR KREMER: ...I'm taking too much time, but I think it's just that this is trying to clarify because we don't know we're at if, say, somebody could come in and put up a portable still and go beyond what the intention of the bill was. And that's, basically,...

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. Well, I want to ask you next time a little more about these portable stills and what they are...

SENATOR KREMER: Okay.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...and will not these people build full-fledged plants within a short period of time thereafter anyway, and what's wrong with that. And I want to explore this a lot more, I think.

SENATOR KREMER: Okay, I've got my light on, too, and I'd be glad to dialog with you a little bit more at that time. But I think at one time they talked about that, and I don't know where that's at, and I'd have to explore that a little bit more, that says if you only have your plant constructed enough to make 3,000 gallons or 2 million gallons, that's all you'd qualify for. You couldn't come and add to that later on and then qualify for more. So I'm not sure where that's at, but it seems like there was some misunderstanding. And, really, all this is trying to clarify what does 100,000 gallons mean,...
