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SENATOR KREMER: ...was a deadline on that and I'd have to get those. So there...we did have something in place that an existing plant could come in and expand and qualify for I think seven and a half cents a gallon rather than the 18 or 20.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay, so Senator Schmit's idea is not really a new concept, is it? I mean it's...

SENATOR KREMER: No.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...it's really kind of building on the same idea, isn't it?

SENATOR KREMER: Unless the plant is not even built in the first place. I mean that's the existing (inaudible).

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay, I'd like to hear more next time about what a still...

SENATOR KREMER: Well, I, you know,...

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...is.

SENATOR KREMER: ...and I'm not sure that ever was...and I don't even know what a portable still is either. I don't have one.

SENATOR BEUTLER: (Laughter) Okay.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Beutler. Senator Schrock.

SENATOR SCHROCK: Mr. President, and members of the Legislature, I was one of those individuals that attended a few meetings this fall with Senator Baker and Senator Kremer, and I think they have pretty well taken charge here as far as what's going to happen in the ethanol industry.
