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SENATOR CUDABACK: I'm sorry.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...under the new language, can they build the plants...

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Beutler, I'm sorry, your time is up.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Thank you, Senator Schrock and Senator Beutler. Senator Thompson.

SENATOR THOMPSON: Thank you, Mr. President. I yield my time to Senator Beutler.

SENATOR CUDABACK: Senator Beutler, you have almost five minutes.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Senator Thompson, thank you. Let me go on with the example. After 30 days, they stop producing on the still and they start construction of the permanent facility. By the way, you would agree that producing alcohol at 8,200 gallons a month is totally uneconomic, wouldn't you?

SENATOR CONNEALY: Yes.

SENATOR BEUTLER: Okay. So, I mean, we don't have small farmers doing that, so that really doesn't work, so they're losing money...

SENATOR CONNEALY: Yes.

SENATOR BEUTLER: ...as they continue to do this, with the hope of getting the credit, I assume. All right. So after they run the still for 30 days and they have the qualifying amount, do they have to run the still any more?

SENATOR CONNEALY: No, they don't have to run the still any more. Once they've qualified, they've qualified, but they don't qualify for any more credits until they operate a working ethanol plant. So you qualify for the amount of credits that
